

## LITERACY

1. Read the chapter 'Dream – Catching' from The BFG. If you don't have a copy of the book at home, there's a link to the chapter below. When you have read the chapter, have a go at answering the questions about the text (attached below).
2. Look at the made up language in the chapter you read yesterday. Highlight / underline/ list the made up words. With a grown up, brother or sister, think about why Roald Dahl makes up words. What effect does it have?  
Can you make up 3 new words and write a definition, using each word in a sentence.  
For example;  
**A Flingehop (noun)** – a type of dance which involves the person hopping on one leg at a time whilst waving ribbons above their head.  
The children at the Round Hill school disco danced the **flingehop** really well.
3. Think about a dream you have for the future. What would you like to do when you grow up? Where would you like to visit? What would you like to achieve? Write a paragraph showing what your dream for the future might look like. There are some examples attached below.
4. Use a jar or pot to make a 'dream jar' like the ones that the BFG uses to hold the dreams he catches. Your jar could reflect the dream that you have for the future in some way. For example, if you wrote about your dream involving playing cricket for England, you might have a jar containing green glitter, a score card with your name on and a mini cricket bat. If you dream of being a scientist, perhaps your jar could include a potion bottle or some scientific equipment.  
If you prefer, you could make a dream jar which looks like the dreams in the book, with swirling colours and sparkles. If you choose to do this, have a look at the instructions attached below which you could use to help you. There is also a sheet attached below to give you some ideas.  
If you can't make a jar for any reason, use the template attached below to draw what your dream might look like instead.  
Be careful if you use a glass jar!
