



Tonal Shading






Key Terms tone, blending, graduation, smooth, contrast, creative, composition, balance. Your first task this lesson is to use the correct pressure when blending light, medium and dark tones. A lighter pressure will achieve a lighter tone and a heavier pressure will achieve a darker tone.

You can also use blending tools and your fingers to achieve a smooth graduation of tone. You can also use rubbers to create white highlights.

Think about composition and balance within each section. Try to have light sections next to darker sections to create an interesting contrast. Your main task today is to add tone to this picture of a Viking long ship. Think about the light source. Which areas will be darker and lighter? If you would rather draw your own long ship from scratch you can do that instead!
